Peter Edward Heineman (Wilhelm August³, John Henry⁴, John (Johannes)⁵ Heinemann, Johann Jost⁶, Johann Henrich⁷) was born in Keokuk, Iowa April 28, 1927.

Peter was born the second child to Wilhelm and Lucille (Jensen) Heineman in Keokuk, Iowa ([birth certificate](#)). He attended Garfield Grade School, Keokuk Junior High and Keokuk Senior High School. He lived with his family in the house his father built on Fulton street.

A lover of music, he received his initial musical training on the violin while in grade school from Robert Livingston, a professional symphony violinist. In eighth grade he also started saxophone lessons from the Keokuk Municipal Band director William "Bill" Bowers who had retired from playing with John Phillip Susa's band.



By the time he was in the ninth grade, Peter was playing saxophone in local "jobber bands" which he continued doing throughout high school. The bands performed at dances for schools, colleges, clubs, and lodges in a one hundred mile radius surrounding Keokuk. He also substituted in traveling bands playing in the area and was a member of the Keokuk Municipal Band.

Immediately after graduation from Keokuk Senior High School in 1945, Peter enlisted as an Apprentice Seaman in the [U.S. Maritime Service](#) in St. Louis, Missouri. He received his basic and advanced engine room training on Catalina Island, California and was Coast Guard licensed to serve as fireman, oiler, or water tender.

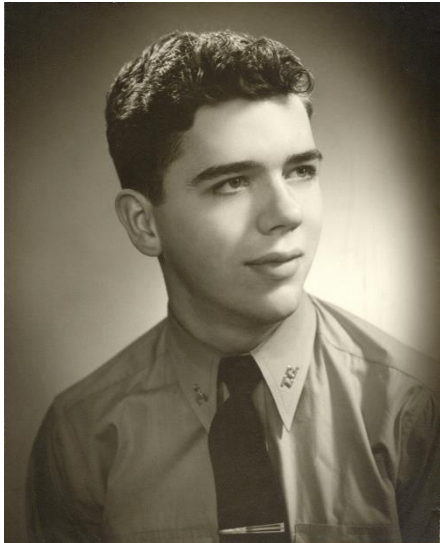

Upon graduation he was discharged from the U.S. Maritime Service to serve with the Merchant Marine Corps. He served in the Atlantic and Pacific war zones from 1945-1946. Ships that Peter served on were the U.S. Army Transport Cefalu, U.S. Army Transport William R. Gibson, U.S. Hospital Ship Republic, and the Union Oil Tanker S.S. Albert J. Berres.

Peter was discharged in 1946. After Merchant Marine Corps service Peter joined the Iowa National Guard in 1947, Company "C", 68th Infantry Regiment as a private.

During his college days he again played in "jobber bands," the college marching and swing bands, and the Keokuk Municipal Band. After graduation, Peter took a job as station agent with the newly formed Ozark Airlines headquartered in St. Louis. He was trained and licensed as a SAWRS weather observer and a radio communications technician. Assigned to the Keokuk Municipal Airport, his duties also included serving as a reservation and ticketing agent.



Peter left Ozark Air Lines to accept a position as Program Director for the Council Bluffs, Iowa Railroad Y.M.C.A., moving to Council Bluffs with his wife and daughter in 1953. He also transferred to Headquarters Company, 168th Infantry Regiment of the Iowa National Guard. Peter later resigned his commission in 1962 as a 2nd Lieutenant after serving for 15 years.

As YMCA Program Director he was instrumental in acquiring property north of Council Bluffs that had originally been a Boy Scout camp. A very successful YMCA Day Camp program was established. The YMCA programs for young girls was also added using the facilities and staff.

Leaving the YMCA, Peter joined Inland Manufacturing Company in Omaha, Nebraska on their national sales staff in their automotive products division. He remained with Inland for 15 years when in 1970 he was offered a full-time teaching position with the newly formed Iowa Western Community College. There he taught a variety of subjects over the next 23 years advancing to a Professor position. He retired from teaching in 1993 to help Doris in their flower and gift business.



Peter was an avid outdoorsman who enjoyed canoeing, backpacking, scuba diving and sailing. He was a Boy Scouts of America troop leader for over 15 years and

received the [District Award of Merit](#), [Scouter's Key](#), [Scouter's Training Award](#), and [Silver Beaver](#).

Peter assisted Doris in her International Rotary activities and is a Paul Harris Fellow and a charter member of International Rotary Foundation Benefactors. In addition to various business organizations, Peter was an original Board of Directors member of the Loess Hills Area Education Agency and also served on the Board of Directors of the Omaha Goodwill Industries, Inc.

Doris Jean Crum (Alfred Arthur³, Harry A.⁴, Simeon⁵) third daughter born to Alfred Arthur Crum and Gladys Mae Linder, was born at 7:45 am in Kahoka, Clark Co., Missouri November 25, 1931 ([birth certificate](#)).

She was born during the great depression. She was delivered by a mid-wife; Dr Gray (female) was unable to reach the isolated farmhouse in time.

The family moved to a larger farm between Canton and Wayland, Missouri before Doris started school. She remembers her father telling the children to be wary of the tramps that would hitchhike the roads during the depression. They would come to the house for food and you did not dare refuse them for fear they would burn the barn. She attended a one-room schoolhouse that was several miles from their farm, so she walked to school.



The family moved again to a farm owned by Gladys' brother-in-law further from the school. She stayed with her Aunt Mitt and Uncle Walt Linder. The school was located on their property.

At age 10, the family moved to a dairy farm a few miles from Keokuk, Iowa where she attended high school.

Life on the farm was harsh. A usual day began at 4:00 in the morning, dress in the dark (no electricity, phones or indoor plumbing) milked several head of cows before getting ready for school. The walk to school (grades 1-6) in Summerville was 6 miles.

Doris rode the school bus to Keokuk each day to attend Junior High. Her father died when she was 12. She became Class Secretary in her last year in Junior high and sang in the School Choir.

As mentioned, she met her future husband, Peter E. Heineman, at an American Legion dance where he was playing saxophone in the dance band. They married in 1949. They lived in Canton Missouri while her husband was attending Culver Stockton College and later moved to Council Bluffs, Iowa where she has resided ever since.

Doris stayed at home to raise their three children; Sharen Lee, Bim August, and Peter Lea until they were old enough to be in school full time. When her husband Pete became Program Director for the YMCA, Doris became interested in working with recovering Polio victims. With the support from Mercy hospital Physical Therapist, Luella Schlofeldt, Doris formed the first ever Handicapped Swim program for Polio victims for which she was awarded the YMCA Volunteer of the Year Award.

An active member of the Epworth United Methodist Church, Doris was a Parish Visitor for 12 years.

She later went to work at the Immanuel Lutheran Medical Center in Omaha Nebraska working her way up to office manager for the psychiatric center at the hospital that she held for 3 years. When one of the doctors left to start his own practice, she went with him to manage the office. When the firm closed 18 years later, Doris and a friend started Finishing Touches, Inc. that they ran together for 3 years. Doris bought out the friend's interest in the company and purchased Betty's Flowers, merging the two businesses to become Betty's Flowers Finishing Touches, Inc.

Doris joined the Council Bluffs Noon Rotary in 1989 and served as President from 1996 to 1997. She was presented with the District Outstanding President Award for 1996-1997. That year, she received the Outstanding Community Service Award and Membership Award for her Club. Doris and her husband Pete are Paul Harris Fellows and Charter Members of International Rotary Foundation Benefactors. She was active on the District level as the Polio Plus Chair 1997-98 and again in 1998-99 and served as a trainer for the PETS 1996-97. Doris and Pete attended numerous RI Conventions. She served as Assistant District Governor, District Governor, District and Zone Foundation Chair.

Doris was a member of the Council Bluffs Chamber of Commerce, past president Chamber Small Business Association, past president Chamber Networking Breakfast, past president Council Bluffs Altrusa Club, past Secretary Omaha River City Regents, member Council Bluffs American Business Women Association, board member Pottawattamie County Visiting Nurses Association, member of the Iowa Western Community College Advisory Board, and board member Bluffs Arts Council among others.



Doris Heineman died at 9:20 on Tuesday, November 13th aged 80 years, 11 months, 19 days at Bergan Mercy Hospital, Omaha, NE due to complications from bile duct procedures.

She attended a one-room schoolhouse that was several miles from their farm. At age 10, the family moved to a dairy farm a few miles from Keokuk, IA where she attended both Junior and Senior High School. While attending Senior High, she worked at Graham Hospital along with her Mother who was a Practical Nurse. Doris married Peter E. Heineman, September 11, 1949 in Keokuk, IA. They lived in Canton, Missouri while her husband attended Culver Stockton College and later moved to Council Bluffs where she has resided ever since. She stayed at home to raise their three children, Sharen Lee, Bim August, and Peter Lea until they were old enough to be in school. When her husband became Program Director for the YMCA, she formed the first-ever handicapped swim program for Polio victims. An active member of the Epworth United Methodist Church, she was a Parish Visitor for 12 years. Later, she went to work at the Immanuel Lutheran Medical Center in Omaha, Nebraska becoming the office manager for the psychiatric center at the hospital. When

one of the doctors left to start his own practice, she went with him to manage the office; a position she held for 18 years. Doris and a friend started *Finishing Touches, Inc.* that they ran together for 3 years. Doris bought out the friend's interest in the company and purchased Betty's Flowers, merging the two businesses which she and her husband ran for 12 years. Doris was an avid [Rotarian](#) having served as Club President, Assistant District Governor, District Governor, District and Zone Foundation Chair, Polio Plus Chair, and PETS trainer. She has been a member of the Council Bluffs Chamber of Commerce, past president Chamber Small Business Association, past president Chamber Networking Breakfast, past president Council Bluffs Altrusa Club, past secretary Omaha River City Regents, member Council Bluffs American Business Women Association, board member Pottawattamie County Visiting Nurses Association, member of the Iowa Western Community College Advisory Board, Alegent Health Mercy Hospital Guild President, and board member Bluffs Arts Council among others. She is survived by her husband; three children; and two grandchildren; sister, Marjorie; nieces and nephews. She is preceded in death by her parents and sister, Irene. A CELEBRATION of her life will be on Saturday 11am at Hoy-Kilnoski Funeral Home. Interment will be at a later date in the Keokuk National Cemetery.
