Wilhelm August Heineman (John Henry⁴, John (Johannes)⁵ Heinemann, Johann Jost⁶, Johann Henrich⁷) was born in Keokuk, Iowa Friday, October 13, 1893 to John Henry Heineman and Bertha Anne Burger.

He was the middle of three boys. His mother had wanted a girl so badly, and Wilhelm was such a pretty baby that she refused to cut his hair. Boys, then, as well as girls, wore dresses until they were old enough to have their first long pants.



One of his cousins; a baby who couldn't say "Wilhelm" christened him "Bim" and Bim he remained to all who knew him for the rest of his life. He was a good athlete-track, football, baseball, and basketball. He kept his interest in these sports.



Bim graduated from high school in Keokuk, Iowa, June 13, 1913 and really wanted to become a doctor. However there was not enough money and his parents really didn't want him to move away from home. He settled for becoming a draftsman in his father's footsteps at the Carter Sash and Door Company in Keokuk.



He voluntarily entered the service of United States in World War I on December 13, 1917 and served over 20 months in Europe. He was gassed once (mustard gas) and shell shocked-and to his remaining days blamed his receding hairline on the helmet he wore. Bim was discharged on September 22, 1919, at Camp Dodge, at which time he was master sergeant Cas. Det. No. 1444, Demob Group.

He married **Lucile Marguerite Jensen** June 16, 1920 in Albert Lea, Minn.

Lucile was the adored baby sister of a family of seven. Her father was well to do, and she wanted for nothing. As a child she was even paid to eat because she was rather scrawny. She graduated from Albert Lea High School.

She grew up into a beautiful young woman who enjoyed dancing and parties. She was one of the few lucky women of that era who had a college education-two years at Cedar Falls, Iowa (Teacher's College) and two years at Ames (Iowa State). She majored in home economics. After she graduated she taught high school home economics for four years at Huron, South Dakota, and Mankato, Minnesota.

She met her future husband, Wilhelm, on a blind date rigged by her roommate at Ames. The roommate was engaged to my Wilhelm's cousin. The cousin and Wilhelm came to Ames for a homecoming game.

Lucile contracted typhoid fever when their first child was about 18 months old and during the building of their home. Things were so "touch and go" that the house was boarded up and they lived with his parents. After the typhoid ran its course, Lucile suffered from inflammatory rheumatism. Her legs and arms had scars where pus was drained. An abscess formed on the ball of one femur where it fits into the hip socket. It malformed the bone and ate away the end of cartilage. It was many months before she could walk without crutches-and she had a limp the remainder of her life.

Lucile carried on her home economics crusade after marriage. She made most of her own and her daughters clothing. If something wasn't right, she ripped. Each seem was basted before sewing; no pinning. She loved new recipes, and through her eyes her children learned to appreciate the beautiful things in life.

As in all lifetimes, there were good times and bad. The great depression did not hit Bim and Lucile as hard as it did some families, but it was at this time Mr. Carter, who owned the sash and door factory, died and the mill dismantled and sold. For the first time in his life Bim was out of a job. He worked for a time in a large chicken hatchery. He refinished furniture. Then he worked for several years as a salesman in a furniture store, Schell-Demple, owned by a cousin. He hated that job-because he couldn't stand selling shoddy merchandise.

Next he worked as foreman of the woodworking shop and

designer for Thomas Truck and Caster Company who made carts (baggage, dollies, etc.) for moving heavy items. It was there he lost the tip of his wedding ring finger in a planer on a rush job. His comment, "Never knew a woodworker who died with all his fingers."

He was a member of the St. Paul United Church of Christ of which he was a past member of the board of deacons, also a member of the Baraca class, which he taught for several years and a member of the American Legion.



He was quiet, and a strict disciplinarian. His fondness of practical knowledge, his love of nature, and his belief in the worthiness of all human beings are his legacy.

Wilhelm August Heineman died shortly before noon, Wednesday January 5, 1966 in Veteran's Hospital, Omaha, Nebraska, at 72 years of age from prostate cancer. He is buried in the National Cemetery in Keokuk.

Wilhelm A. Heineman, 72, of 518 Fulton street died shortly before noon Wednesday at the Veteran's Hospital in Omaha, Neb., where he had been a patient since Sunday. He had been in failing health the past 10 months.

Born October 13, 1893 in Keokuk, he lived here all his life. His parents were John Henry and Bertha Anne Burger Heineman.

He entered the service of United States in World War I on December 13, 1917, served over 20 months in Europe and was discharged on September 22, 1919, at Camp Dodge, at which time he was master sergeant Cas. Det. No. 1444, Edmob Group.

He married Lucille Marguerite Jensen June 16, 1920 at Albert Lea, Minn. She survives.

He was a member of the St. Paul United Church of Christ of which he was a past member of the board of deacons, also a member of the Baraca class, which he taught for several years and a member of the American Legion.
