**John Sr. Mallory** (Thomas<sup>10</sup>, Captain Roger<sup>11</sup>, Rev. Thomas<sup>12</sup>, Reverend Thomas<sup>13</sup>, Sir William<sup>14</sup>, William<sup>15</sup>, Sir John<sup>16</sup>, William<sup>17</sup>, John<sup>18</sup>, William<sup>19</sup>) was born in VA abt. 1705 to Thomas Mallory and Elizabeth Higgason.

He married **Anne Coyne** (Edward<sup>10</sup>) birth date unknown. They had the following children:

**Col. Nicholas Lewis** (Col. Robert<sup>10</sup>, Col. John II<sup>11</sup>, Maj. John<sup>12</sup>, John Lewis<sup>13</sup> Pricket, Lewis Rycketts (ap<sup>14</sup> Richard), Richard<sup>15</sup> Lewis\_) was born in Castalia, Albemarle Co. VA January 19, 1734. He was the second son of Robert Lewis of Belvior and Jane Meriwether.

He married **Mary (Capt. Molly) Walker** in 1758.

**Mary (Capt. Molly) Walker** (Dr. Thomas<sup>10</sup>, Maj. Thomas<sup>11</sup>, Lt. Col. John<sup>12</sup>, Maj. Thomas<sup>13</sup>) was the daughter of Dr. Thomas Walker and Mildred Thornton of Castle Hill.

In 1735, Nicholas's grandfather obtained patents from King George III to approximately 19,000 acres in Albemarle County east of Charlottesville. One parcel of 1020 acres was located west of the Rivanna River, the area which now is the Locust Grove and Belmont neighborhoods. It became known as "The Farm" because it was the one cleared area in a virgin forest.

A main house and out buildings were built at "The Farm" on the hill facing the river to the east. The house burned after a couple of decades. Nicholas Lewis, grandson of Meriwether, inherited the property in 1762 and built another main house facing the river around 1770. It was described as a place of beauty surrounded by a garden of roses, shrubs and fine fruit. It could have been built on or near the foundations for the first house. A listing in The Mutual Assurance Society of Virginia records from 1805 may describe the house. It was a wooden dwelling two stories high, 48 feet long and 22 feet wide. There is an active spring down the hill a couple of hundred yards to the south.



All that remains is the kitchen or cook's house. It now is in the middle of a middle class housing subdivision facing Twelfth Street. It is still surrounded by mature hardwood trees and retains its view of Monticello.



Col. Lewis was a member of Committee of Safety and Convention of 1775, an officer of militia against Cherokee Indians in 1776, and an officer in the Revolutionary War.

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*Letter from Thomas Jefferson, August 18, 1813 "Nicholas Lewis, the second of his father's brothers, commanded a regiment of militia in the successful expedition of 1776 against the Cherokee Indians; who, seduced by the agents of the British government to take up the hatchet against us, had committed great havoc on our southern frontier, by murdering and scalping helpless women and children, according to their cruel and cowardly principles of warfare. The chastisement they then received closed the history of their wars, and prepared them for receiving the elements of civilization, which, zealously inculcated by the present government of the United States, have rendered them an industrious, peaceable, and happy people. This member of the family of Lewises, whose bravery was so successfully proved on this occasion, was endeared to all who knew him by his inflexible probity, courteous disposition, benevolent heart, and engaging modesty and manners. He was the umpire of all the private differences of his country-selected always by both parties. He was also the guardian of Meriwether Lewis,...who had lost his father at an early age."*

Col. Nicholas Lewis died December 8, 1808 at 74 years of age. Nicholas Lewis was buried on his property in a cemetery on a hilltop overlooking the river where his gravestone says January 19, 1734 to December 8, 1808.

Mary (Capt. Molly) Walker died February 9, 1824 at 81 years of age.
